This month, we pay tribute to the remarkable contributions of black educators who have not only dedicated their lives to shaping young minds but have also championed equity, diversity, and inclusion in education. From pioneering educators who blazed trials in the face of adversity to contemporary leaders who continue to inspire change, we honor their legacies and draw inspiration from their wisdom.

This month, we shine a spotlight on Black educators who have made significant contributions to the field of education:

- Dr. Brent Jones: First Black Male Superintendent of Seattle Public Schools in more than two decades.
- W.E.B. Du Bois: Du Bois was a prominent sociologist, historian, and civil rights activist. He co-founded the NAACP and was an influential proponent of education as a means to combat racial inequality. Du Bois emphasized the importance of higher education for Black Americans and conducted groundbreaking sociological research on race relations.
- Dr. Robert L Hughes: Dr. Hughes served as the president of Seattle Central College from 1974 to 1982. During his tenure, he focused on increasing access to higher education for underrepresented minority groups and expanding programs to meet the needs of a diverse student population.
